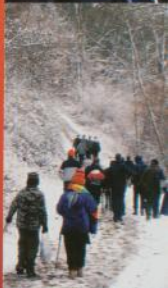
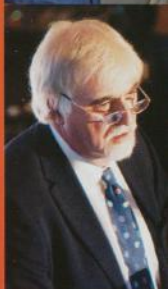

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Chief Executive's report

The year of April 2006 to March 2007 was a period of reflection, preparation and anticipation for the significant changes which would begin to take place in the following year.



At a European level many projects were beginning their last year as the old programmes began to finish and the new programmes were still embryonic.

At a UK level, the advent of a new Prime Minister was still some months away, although the Treasury review of the role of the sector was welcomed by many as a positive and thoughtful contribution.

At a Wales level, the shape of our new government remained uncertain, but positive preparatory work continued toward an Assembly Government Strategic Action Plan to guide the work with the sector, and in understanding ways in which civil society could engage with the new Assembly processes resulting from the Government of Wales Act.

At a local level, the role of the sector in designing, delivering and scrutinising public services was well reflected in the Beecham review and provides a challenging agenda for the future of public services.

At a neighbourhood level, the future of Communities First is subject to review.

So, at every level, change is in the air, but in the meantime, the needs of communities and the organisations who serve them remain our paramount concern. This report demonstrates our contribution to the continuing development and support of the third sector in Wales which has contributed so much but can and will do much more in the coming years.

This report outlines WCVA's activities and achievements for the year, against its key objectives, which were to:

- Support working relationships between the voluntary sector, and government and public bodies.
- Support and promote the work of voluntary and community groups at national and local level.
- Support and promote volunteering and the interests of volunteers.
- Promote community cohesion and inclusion and build social capital.
- Develop and support new initiatives.
- Enhance resources available to the voluntary sector.
- Improve its performance and effectiveness.

WCVA achieves its stated objectives through a wide range of funding, training, information, advice, research, and policy activities, which are designed to enhance and support volunteering and voluntary organisations throughout Wales. Significant activities and services that contributed to the achievement of the stated objectives included:

- Helpdesk service, providing a prompt response to requests for information
- Communities First helpline
- A comprehensive suite of information sheets
- A comprehensive and interactive website, www.wcva.org.uk
- A volunteering website, www.volunteering-wales.net
- Twice monthly magazine, *Network Wales*
- Twice monthly members e bulletin
- Monthly *funding news* e bulletin
- Monthly *trustee news* e bulletin
- Monthly *volunteering news* e bulletin
- An extensive training programme
- A programme of conferences and events
- A research programme providing data about the size and work of the voluntary sector
- Voluntary Sector Support Unit, providing advice and training on European funding
- An extensive policy programme – keeping the sector informed of policy developments, identifying views and concerns, formulating and promoting policy responses, representing the sector and facilitating the participation of relevant organisations in government and public body working groups and partnerships
- Criminal Records Unit, providing access to police checks for voluntary sector staff and volunteers
- Administration of grant schemes providing funding for volunteering, environmental and recycling projects, employment and training, mental health services, community groups, volunteer bureaux, county voluntary councils and other purposes

Achievements and performance

WCVA assesses its effectiveness by monitoring the take-up of its services, levels of satisfaction with its services, the extent of its engagement with the sector, achievement of target dates, extent of the sector's engagement with public bodies, and the extent to which public policy takes account of the sector's interests. A summary of achievements for each main objective is provided in the following sections.

Support working relationships between the voluntary sector, and government and public bodies



WCVA has ensured that details of over 68 policy consultations were disseminated to the sector through its publication and communication channels. It has maintained contact with voluntary and community groups through quarterly regional policy events, consultation meetings, and support for a wide range of networks, involving almost 1,800 people. It prepared briefing papers on eight policy issues, and responded to 23 policy initiatives of interest to the sector, including European Structural Funds, the Review of Local Services undertaken by Sir Jeremy Beecham, and the Government of Wales Bill. The sector's interests were reflected in:

- The recommendations of the Review of Local Services undertaken by Sir Jeremy Beecham.
- *Making the Connections – Delivering Beyond Boundaries* – the Assembly Government response to the Beecham Review.
- Continued third sector representation on all Wales Spatial Plan partnerships.
- Third sector representation on the Assembly Government working group on community engagement.
- The Welsh Assembly Government's draft *Strategic Action Plan* for the Voluntary Sector Scheme.

National Assembly Voluntary Sector Scheme

WCVA continues to facilitate the involvement of the voluntary sector in the six monthly Ministerial meetings between each Minister and relevant voluntary sector networks, and the Voluntary Sector Partnership Council, both of which take place under the auspices of the Voluntary Sector Scheme. It has facilitated third sector networks concerned with communities, equalities and human rights, substance misuse, community justice, and health social care and well-being, as well as the network of local health and social care facilitators based with the county voluntary councils. It has maintained its support for the compact between the

sector and the environmental public bodies; and ensured that the sector's relationships, through compacts, with the Welsh Development Agency and ELWa have been maintained following their merger with the Assembly Government.

In 2006 – 07 the Welsh Assembly Government published its first draft Strategic Action Plan for the Voluntary Sector Scheme and WCVA, along with Participation Cymru, facilitated four regional consultation events on behalf of the Assembly Government to gather the views of the sector. The final version of the Strategic Action Plan, which will set out the vision for the Assembly Government's future work with the sector, is expected to be published in late 2007.

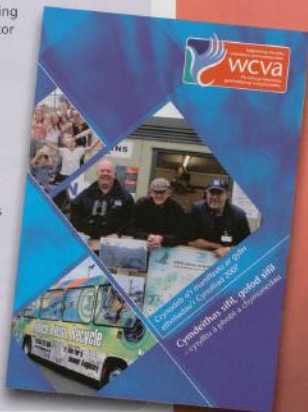
Civil society, civil space – Connecting with people and communities

In the months running up to the Assembly election in May 2007, WCVA published a new manifesto, *Civil society, civil space – connecting with people and communities*, which emphasised the need for the new Welsh Assembly Government to encourage voluntary and community groups to play a bigger role in helping create a better Wales. The manifesto also suggested that the Assembly Government increased the voluntary sector's involvement in shaping policy and that of local communities in community strategies and spending priorities for their area.

Other proposals included that the Assembly Government works with the sector to:

- Create a new fund to build the sector's capacity to deliver citizen-centred public services.

- Extend its programmes to increase volunteering in all of its major policy areas.
- Target extra funding for improved sector services such as community transport in rural and peripheral areas.
- Involve more diverse interests in the Assembly's enhanced legislative powers created by the Government of Wales Bill.





Helen Mary Jones AM told delegates at WCVA's annual conference that no politician could afford not to engage with civil society, but the sector has to demonstrate that it really does speak for the people it says it represents.

Partnership capacity building fund

This Assembly fund is designed specifically in recognition of the contribution representatives and their own organisations make to the work of the Voluntary Sector Partnership Council, and participating in meetings with Ministers.

In 2006 – 07 bids were invited for additional funds that had been set aside to support the most under-resourced networks. Five projects were funded under this additional bidding round, totalling £33,000.

Post Beecham

The report of Sir Jeremy Beecham into local public services in Wales placed great emphasis on the importance of seamless services and accountability to citizens. It also promoted the principle of a mixed economy of provision, in other words, that providers should be drawn from a variety of public, private and third sector organisations.

In the light of this report, and the subsequent response by the Welsh Assembly Government, Local Service Boards have been created and new community strategies guidance will be consulted upon and released. The Local Service Board in each county should include the third sector and it is likely to oversee the delivery of the community strategy as well as ensuring seamless citizen-focused services.

Third sector and local government relationships

A joint WCVA/CVC survey this year revealed that the relationships between the third sector and local government vary in their quality. Compacts remain in place or are being re-drafted, and many include other public sector bodies such as local health boards and the police. All but two counties have a Joint Liaison Committee as a main interface between the local authority and the third sector.

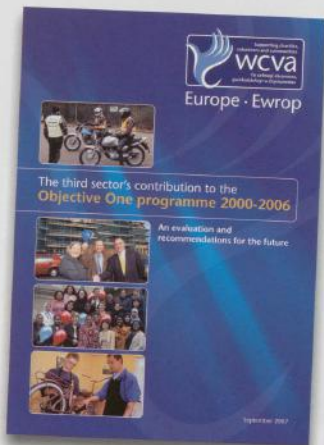
The third sector recognises that its engagement in Local Service Boards will be crucial to its influence over local policies and services. Some counties are also beginning to look at ways of involving the third sector in scrutiny processes.

Keeping track of government spending on the sector

Reported expenditure from the Welsh Assembly Government to the third sector rose from £125.3 million in 2004-05 to £162.5 million in 2005-06. This was due to a number of factors: funding from the housing directorate, which includes housing grants to housing associations and Supporting People funding, increased dramatically, from £39 million to £99 million. However, expenditure from European programmes decreased from £29 million to £18 million, and funding from the Communities directorate fell from £19 million to £11 million. Assembly sponsored public bodies provided funding of about £43

million, with the main change being a drop in Sports Council for Wales funding from £14 million to £6 million.

Funding from local authorities was £160 million in 2005-06, an increase of £40 million from two years previously. Of this income, 70 per cent was payment for services. Local Health Board funding was £13 million, similar to 2004-05. Other funding comes from UK government departments whose responsibilities are not devolved (eg criminal justice). Up to date information is not available for these sources. Overall, funding has increased, but the fall in Supporting People funding and European funding which is known to have happened in 2006-07, mean that the trend may not be sustained.



Third sector organisations have accessed £206.7 million from the Objective 1 programme during 2000 – 2006. 319 different organisations have been project sponsors, of which around 60 per cent sponsored one grant with a few organisations sponsoring 11 or more grants. The average grant was £306,351. The third sector made a substantial impact on the outcomes used to measure the effectiveness of the Objective 1 programme as a whole.

WCVA research

WCVA research continues to underpin much of our policy work, and provides the latest data on the third sector in Wales (see panel page 23). Current research projects include:

Support and promote the work of voluntary and community groups at national and local level

WCVA has continued to administer funding for county voluntary councils that provide the local support structure for voluntary and community groups, under the auspices of the five year Partnership Agreement with the Assembly Government, and through European funding consortia.

It has worked with the county voluntary councils to develop new service specifications, setting out the full range of services voluntary and community groups can expect from WCVA and the CVCs, and incorporating a new, shared information and training framework covering all aspects of establishing and managing organisations.

LVS and Infrastructure funding

Through the Local Voluntary Services Scheme administered on behalf of the Assembly Government, WCVA provided core funding of over £2.76 m to the nineteen county voluntary councils. It also coordinated consortia projects, extending the capacity building activities of the CVCs in the Objective 1 and Objective 3 areas. With a collective membership of more than 6,800 groups, and contact with as many as 21,000 groups through their local networks, CVCs play a vital role in supporting and representing the interests of the local voluntary sector. WCVA has continued to work closely with CVCs to publicise the voluntary sector scheme and policy issues of interest to local groups. 2007/08 heralds the first year of core funding to the voluntary sector infrastructure in Wales (WCVA, CVCs and Volunteer Bureaux) through the Partnership Agreement signed with the Assembly in October 2005.

A wide range of **direct support, information and training services** have been maintained, including:

- 13,745 enquiries dealt with by the Helpdesk (11,420 in previous year), including 3,130 Communities First helpline enquiries

- Over 350,000 visits to WCVA website
- Over 6,300 documents downloaded from the information area of the WCVA website
- Over 40,000 visits to Building Strong Bridges voluntary sector health website
- 113 new information sheets published in partnership with county voluntary councils, as part of a new, shared Information Framework
- 76 Grantfinder searches facilitated
- 44 general training courses arranged for over 500 participants
- 1,050 participants in WCVA conferences
- 601 European funding enquiries dealt with
- 41 European training courses arranged for 227 participants
- 12,008 CRU checks completed, including 5,520 volunteers

- Over 13,000 Helpdesk enquiries
- Over 350,000 visits to WCVA website
- Over 1,000 conference participants
- Over 12,000 CRU checks completed
- Over 80 training courses for over 700 participants
- Over 100 new information sheets published

Membership

WCVA's membership has seen steady growth during the last year, particularly within the e-membership category, which now has over 700 organisations receiving focused updates on funding, volunteering and trusteeship.

Two new membership services have been introduced in partnership with private companies. WCVA members can now access lowest-cost rates on energy through a partnership with leading broker LSI Utilities. Members can also take advantage of substantial discounts on vehicle hire with Enterprise Rent-a-Car.

Over 1,700 people attended WCVA conferences, seminars and training events during the year.

Training and skills

The Workforce Hub in Wales (WFH) continued to forge working relationships with Sector Skills Councils (SSCs) at UK and Wales-wide levels. Work has included identifying projects undertaken by the SSCs, and to consider how best the WFH can contribute expertise and knowledge to increase the sector's access to and involvement in the Skills for Business Network (SfBN).

After consultation with a number of partners involved in basic skills, the WFH secured resources to undertake research into how the activity and characteristics of the voluntary sector relate to the basic skills agenda in Wales. This research has led to an analysis of the strengths and gaps in voluntary sector provision/activity and funding opportunities, and will allow the opportunity to develop support and materials in line with other initiatives.

A programme of trustee training was developed as part of the national training programme for the voluntary sector, and will be delivered by CVCs in the coming year. The training has been developed to meet identified need, is in line with

the national occupational standards for trustees and management committees and will cover:

- Governance
- Roles and responsibilities of trustees
- Roles of the officers
- Board and committee structures
- Working with your Chief Officer

As part of the Partnership Agreement's co-ordinated approach to offering better services and training to the voluntary sector, a series of core training courses for infrastructure staff (WCVA, CVCs and Volunteer Centres) were identified and a programme of training delivered across Wales.

The first meeting of the DELLS/voluntary sector compact group aimed to build on the agreement and working relationship formerly established with ELWa. Voluntary sector representatives of the group have been appointed to reflect the DELLS remit for education, lifelong learning and skills. A sub-group was also appointed to specifically consider the issue of funding of informal learning, and will be producing recommendations



for the compact group later in the year. WCVA also secured funding from DELLS to develop accredited training tailored to the need of those working in the voluntary sector in Wales.

Sbardun

Seminars on social housing provision and migrant workers in Wales were among the events staged by third sector organisations at *Sbardun*, the voluntary action pavilion, managed by WCVA at this year's National Eisteddfod in Mold, Flintshire.

Stonewall Cymru hosted a meeting on tackling homophobic hate crime, and sessions by WCVA and CAIS (Cyngor Alcohol Information Service) on funding advice and increasing the number of volunteers were well attended. And from a totally different perspective, children and young people with disabilities were given the chance to take part in fun music therapy sessions during the week.

Guest speaker for the launch event was Aled Eirug, Constitutional Consultant for the National Assembly for Wales, who offered an insight into opportunities for the sector as a result of the Assembly's new petitioning procedures. The new Assembly is giving the chance for people to petition – and get action – for the first time. No more than ten people need to sign a petition to demand action from the Assembly in any area of policy that the Assembly is responsible for.

Exhibitors at this year's *Sbardun* included: Home Start, Antur Teifi, CAIS, Community Network, Barnardos, Breast Cancer Care, British Heart Foundation, CTA (Community Transport Association), Wales Domestic Abuse Helpline, Cymorth Cymru, WRVS, NCH Cymru, Stonewall Cymru and SNAP Cymru.

Publications

With circulation figures of 1,600 and an estimated readership of over 12,000, *Network Wales* offers the third sector in Wales a bi-monthly and bilingual digest of news, comment, opinion and features. Policy and funding advice always comes out on top in WCVA customer satisfaction surveys, while lead stories over the last year have included the voluntary sector's position in a post-Beecham Wales and funding issues.

After nearly a year, the **goodmoves** service, which comprises of WCVA's *Network Jobs* publication, the *Big Issue Cymru* and the SCVO-managed website www.goodmoves.org.uk, has gone from strength to strength. Set up to enable third sector organisations to access a reasonably priced recruitment service, the **goodmoves** package is beginning to change the way employers are finding new staff. *Network Jobs* is mailed out each week to WCVA members and subscribers and there is an ever-increasing list of recipients who receive the supplement via email.

Support and promote volunteering and the interests of volunteers

Millennium Volunteers

Millennium Volunteers is a UK wide volunteering programme for 16-24 year olds, which aims to offer challenging and interesting volunteering opportunities for all young people.

Funding is available for organisations able to offer or develop volunteering opportunities for young people aged 16-24 in line with the Millennium Volunteers award. Opportunities should be challenging, offer a community benefit, and personal development to the young people and enable them to complete 200 hours. The Millennium Volunteers scheme awarded approx £250,000 in small grants to 26 organisations.

WCVA has maintained its work as the strategic lead body for volunteering in Wales. It has advocated policies that benefit volunteers, raised the public profile of volunteering, helped people access volunteering opportunities, and helped to raise standards in managing volunteers. Through the Infrastructure Partnership Agreement, it has funded and supported the network of volunteer centres, and agreed a new service specification for volunteer centre core funding to be introduced from April 2007. It has provided funding for projects involving volunteers. Achievements this year include:

- Over 280,000 visits to the volunteering-wales.net website
- Recruiting 1,563 young people to the Millennium Volunteers programme
- Introducing the Investing in Volunteers Initiative, with 18 organisations registering for accreditation
- Supporting and funding local volunteer centres that recruited and placed almost 4199 volunteers, through the volunteering in Wales Fund and VEIS scheme
- Introducing arrangements for core funding for volunteer centres from April 2007
- Funding projects involving 4,381 volunteers through the Volunteering in Wales Fund
- Funding projects involving 23,451 volunteers through the Social Risk Fund and Communities First Trust Fund

Russell Commission

The Russell Commission made a number of recommendations to 'transform the ways in which young people become involved in volunteering activity'. To support this 'step change' the Welsh Assembly Government made funding available through a number of existing grant schemes managed by WCVA: Millennium Volunteers, Environment Wales, the Communities First Trust Fund and Wales: the Active Community. These 'Russell enhanced' schemes allocated funding totalling £378,762 to 36 projects involving young people (aged 16-24) in volunteering, as follows:

Millennium Volunteers: £180,000 for six projects that will support capacity building in national organisations, enabling them to provide more

volunteering opportunities to young people.

Environment Wales awarded grants, totalling £50,000, to 11 groups in Wales to provide young people with green volunteering opportunities.

Communities First Trust Fund: £59,344 for six awards to build the capacity of local volunteer-involving organisations to engage and support young volunteers within 'harder to reach communities'. The fund covered the 142 wards, sub wards and "communities of interest" across Wales under the current Communities First Trust Fund.

Wales: the Active Community: £89,418 for nine feasibility studies to research new ideas in promoting and encouraging youth volunteering on a Wales-wide basis.

Wales Volunteer of the Year Award 2007

An elderly couple who devoted their lives to raising money for a hospice, and a teenager who helps children with severe learning difficulties were among the winners of the 2007 Wales Volunteer of the Year awards.

The Wales Volunteer of the Year Awards is managed by WCVA and was supported this year by Class Telecommunications.

Over 200 nominations were received from all areas in Wales. People whose names were put forward included leading lights in national or local voluntary organisations, those driving community projects – and people who simply find many different ways to help others. People were nominated in five categories

– adult, young person, group, green and trustee – and the panel of judges chose sixteen winners in each category.

These volunteers are recognised for their initiative, dedication or their personal qualities. They are an inspiration, and the quality of nominations received this year has shown us just how strong the voluntary sector and volunteering ethos is in Wales.

Winners were invited to an award ceremony during Volunteers' Week at the Senedd building in Cardiff Bay hosted by BBC Wales' Jason Mohammad.

Telecommunications

Green category winner – Mike Williams

Mike Williams from Llanelli is in his 16th year volunteering with the National Trust at Dinefwr Park and Castle as a badger watch volunteer.

Now in his 70s, Mike was asked to set up badge watch activities in the Deer Park at Dinefwr Park and 'has made this task his own over the years, developing fascinating opportunities for badgers in their setts'.

From March to September, Mike meets people at the park and takes groups into the woods to watch the badgers come out to meet and play. Volunteers have built a hide there and visitors can sit in it while Mike tells them about the 13 animals in the sett.

'Without Mike's contribution, there would not be the opportunity to for people to see badgers in their natural

habitat at Dinefwr,' said the National Trust's Community and Volunteering Officer Wales Selina Carpenter, who nominated him for the Volunteer of the Year Award.

'People are visiting the area, coming on holiday and staying in Llandello just to take part in the badger watches, which assists with local income for businesses and helps raise the profile of the area.

'Mike is an ambassador for the badgers, the community and the Trust, encouraging learning and giving people the chance of a unique emotional experience. Some people have never seen a badger and certainly not within such close proximity.

'Mike has a passion for wildlife and wants to spread that passion to others.'

Volunteering in Wales Fund (ViWF)

The Volunteering in Wales fund, (ViWF) supported by the Welsh Assembly Government, is one of the primary funding schemes helping in the recruitment of new volunteers. ViWF grants can help in the recruitment and training of new volunteers; encourages activities in areas where volunteering is less well developed; and develops good volunteering practice. £920,301 has been allocated to 20 new volunteering projects, 38 continuation projects and 29 volunteer bureaux. The grantees aim to recruit an estimated 6,100 new volunteers – helping to make a big impact to the quality of life for so many in the communities of Wales.

Volunteer Enhancement Investment Scheme

The Volunteer Enhancement Investment Scheme provides additional funding for many of the Welsh Volunteer Bureaux and the Powys Community Support groups. The aim of the funding is to help improve the quality of service and numbers in the community involved in volunteering activity. £583,716 of Welsh Assembly Government support has been allocated by WCVA in

support of the project and this has been distributed on a county basis to participating consortia members. An estimated 5,400 new volunteers have been recruited by the volunteer bureaux as a result of VEIS funding in the third year of the scheme.

Wales: the Active Community

This Welsh Assembly Government grant scheme, new to WCVA, aims to support volunteering and community involvement. In 2006-07 £1million was awarded to 27 organisations that will deliver Wales-wide projects from 2007 to 2010.

Over the next three years these projects will receive a total of £3million, with the aim of 'rebuilding a sense of community throughout Wales' by raising the profile of and stimulating more volunteering and community development. The grant scheme was only open to those third sector organisations that could deliver their projects on an all-Wales basis, and could effectively target and support people from particular communities; rural, youth, ethnic minorities, older people, disabled people and employees.

Support for Voluntary Intermediary Services (SVIS)

This scheme provides Welsh Assembly Government grant funding to intermediary third sector organisations that support volunteering and encourage co-operation and good practice. The scheme is in its final year and in 2006-07 six organisations were awarded funding totalling £283,746.

Promote community cohesion and inclusion and build social capital

WCVA has developed its support to community organisations both directly and through its membership of the Communities First Support Network. It has continued to press for policies that will support community-led regeneration and for additional resources for community groups; it has provided opportunities for community activists to network and learn from each other; it has stimulated debate and discussion about community regeneration in Wales. Developments this year included:



- A conference for public service providers on public engagement.
- A conference for *Communities First areas on The Communities First jigsaw: getting people, communities and public services to work together.*
- The recruitment of 13 community development apprentices in six pilot areas of Communities First.
- The presentation of a paper on community regeneration in Wales at the Civicus World Assembly.
- Through the Communities First Trust Fund and Social Risk Scheme, awarding grants totalling £5m to over 1,600 groups for projects that build social capital.
- Through the Labour Market initiative, supporting 33 social enterprises that provided employment for over 1,400 economically inactive people, of whom over 760 went into long-term employment.

Communities First (Music) Trust Fund

The Communities First (Music) Trust Fund aims to assist small-scale, community based music activities in Communities First areas in Wales. The purpose of the scheme is to support any type of music activity and community music that involves local people, through small community organisations, and promotes social inclusion. In 2006-07, 92 awards were made totalling £179,724.

One of the projects funded under this scheme was a community concert in Rhondda, featuring Shan Cothi and Pendyrus Male Voice Choir.

Communities First

Putting the citizen at the centre of planning and delivering services has been a key theme this year. Communities First Support Network's conference on public engagement, organised by WCVA, attracted over 100 people from the statutory services eager to hear about ways of working with communities.

Participation Cymru

Participation Cymru's training programme was bigger and better than ever, this year. A new three day course on public engagement offered staff from national and local government and Local Health Boards the chance to develop their skills in working with citizens, users and communities.

Skills for Regeneration

The Skills for Regeneration project is offering 13 apprentices the chance to become qualified, experienced and employed community development workers. The project, led by WCVA on behalf of Communities First Support Network, supports six host organisations to provide each apprentice with an accredited training course and work experience. The thirteen

apprentices, all residents of Communities First areas, started work in January 2007 and have 18 months to complete their apprenticeships.

Social Risk

The Social Risk Fund has been supporting small voluntary organisations across Wales since 2001 and this was the final year in which it was open for applications. It provides grants of up to £10,000 for projects that increase skills and combat social exclusion. It is jointly funded by the Welsh Assembly Government and the European Social Fund, and aims to support the regeneration of communities across Wales by supporting small groups and organisations to try new activities. During 2006-07 grants totalling £1,024,487 were awarded, assisting 108 organisations with projects. In the closing weeks of the scheme, over 150 more applications were received. The scheme will continue to provide funding for these projects, which will finish by March 2008.

Gwraidd

Gwraidd is a scheme set up to support people in areas with both Communities First and Objective 1 status, to develop their skills and confidence so that they can take an active part in their communities. Gwraidd will consider applications for a wide range of activities, which build skills, confidence and participation. In 2006-07, 27 applications were funded totalling £60,355.

Communities First Trust Fund

The Communities First Trust Fund aims to support any type of activity that involves local people, through small community organisations, that benefits their community. The activities must provide some measure of economic, environmental, social or cultural benefit for people living in a Communities First area. In 2006-07, 1,011 awards were made totalling £2,613,943.

Mental Health Grant Scheme

The Local Mental Health Grant Scheme aims to support and enhance the voluntary sector contribution to the care of people experiencing mental health problems, and their families and carers, in Wales. Grants totalling £2,055,049 have been distributed under its main scheme, with a further £61,410.42 distributed under the small grant scheme. The organisations funded under this scheme provide support for people suffering mental health issues which can mean the difference between hospitalisation and independent living in a supportive environment.



Strategic Recycling Scheme (SRS)

WCVA continues to promote recycling and community environmental schemes through the Strategic Recycling Scheme (SRS), the largest ever recycling programme in Wales involving all sectors.

The SRS is an integrated grants scheme, designed to meet the needs of up to a dozen county-scale strategic partnerships in Wales. It offers funding to voluntary/community bodies, in partnership with public and private sector organisations, to enable them to develop sustainable waste diversion and resource recovery projects.

Launched in April 2004, the SRS has now been extended until June 2008 though individual projects are expected to cease at the end of March/ early April 2008, giving WCVA time to properly evaluate the entire programme.

The SRS is funded by European ERDF and ESF money, with 'match' coming from partners themselves plus WAG. The bulk of almost £30 million total projects costs are from the ERDF element of the project.

By the middle of 2007 over 137,000 tonnes of rubbish had been recycled by SRS projects so we are well placed to do better than the final target of 162,881. Although not the biggest project, a good example is in Blaenau Gwent where over 30,000 households have benefited from the project and over 3,000 tonnes have been diverted from landfills in this area alone. As the year draws to a close the first partners are starting to implement their own exit strategies, supported by frequent partnership and management group meetings.

Environment Wales

Environment Wales is a partnership of organisations in the voluntary or third sector, funded by the Welsh Assembly Government. WCVA was delighted to be appointed by the Assembly Government as the administrative partner for Environment Wales. Its aim is to contribute to sustainable development through supporting voluntary action to protect and improve the environment. Since 1992 it has offered a dedicated development service, and provided five grant streams to support practical environmental action. In 2006-07 Environment Wales awarded 166 grants worth £643,765 to community-based projects throughout Wales. This enabled more than 12,000 volunteers to contribute almost 200,000 hours to the benefit of the Welsh environment.

Communities Investment Fund (CIF)

The Communities Investment Fund provides loans of up to £250,000 to emerging and developing social enterprises active in Communities First Objective 1 areas. The Fund aims to develop the sustainability of third sector organisations providing community benefits to the most deprived areas of Wales. Loans are structured to the needs of individual organisations. Special terms, such as extended interest and repayment capital free periods can be considered and grants of up to £20,000 are available to help increase capacity to take on loan finance.

The Fund is financed by the European Regional Development Fund. It is managed and administered by Wales Council for Voluntary Action, in association with its project partners, Development Trusts Association Wales and Wales Co-operative Centre, on behalf of the Communities First Support Network. The Fund was launched in July 2006. During 2006-07, loans totalling £705,000 and grants of £56,000 were awarded to nine organisations. The current financial year has seen a significant increase in proposals coming forward. The current programme is scheduled to end in June 2008.

WCVA has supported the development of a number of new initiatives in the year, some referred to in more depth in the annual report:

- Assisting the development of Advocacy Wales as a new umbrella body for independent advocacy providers, and arranging training and other events for advocacy providers.
- Expanding the Advice Service Network, providing European funding to enable 18 advice agencies to recruit and train 790 volunteers.
- Continuing to develop the work of the Equalities and Human Rights Coalition, and facilitating its response to the proposed Single Equalities and Human Rights Commission.
- Completing its investment in new recycling services through the Strategic Recycling Scheme.
- Launching the Communities Investment Fund, on behalf of the Communities First Support Network, a new £3.4m scheme of grants and loans to support 150 social enterprises and voluntary and community groups in Communities First areas.
- Supporting 14 community development apprenticeships in Communities First areas across Wales through the new Skills for Regeneration Project managed on behalf of the Communities First Support Network.
- Launching the sustainable funding project, to provide affordable, accessible training delivered around Wales, a website, www.sustainablefundingcymru.org.uk, and one-to-one support to a group of organisations.



- Launching a specialist third sector recruitment service, **goodmoves**, in partnership with Big Issue Cymru. Jobs in the third sector in Wales are advertised weekly in Network Jobs, Big Issue Cymru, and on the **goodmoves** website www.goodmoves.org.uk.





- Launching a new package of support for trustees in Wales, including Trustee news, a monthly electronic bulletin, and a new website www.trusteewales.org.uk.
- Launching a new monthly electronic newsletter for individual volunteers, Volunteer news, and re-designing the volunteering pages on www.wcva.org.uk.
- Launching the Gold Star Communities Project, which aims to engage civil society in Wales in alleviating poverty in sub-Saharan Africa, by building a network of long-term development focused partnerships between communities in Wales and in Africa.



The Gold Star project has been endorsed by South African Archbishop Desmond Tutu. 'The work you're doing in communities in Wales and Africa on the Millennium Development Goals is marvellous,' he said. 'Keep your passion going, and you will change the world!'



Rural communities across Wales were urged to take control of their own local assets and services by Dr Kate Broithwaite MBE, Director of the Rural Community Development Programme at the Carnegie Commission. Kate was guest speaker at the Royal Welsh Show, and she called for communities to take over the running of services ranging from housing and renewable energy supplies to sports clubs.

Enhance resources available to the voluntary sector

WCVA has continued to work to enhance resources available to the sector. It has continued to consult with the sector on funding issues, and has sought to extend the range of opportunities for the sector provided by grant schemes administered by WCVA. Achievements in the year included:

- Organising two major voluntary sector funding conferences in North and South Wales.
- Keeping the sector informed of arrangements for new European structural funds for 2007-12, and representing its interests to the Assembly Government and European Commission.
- Securing an extension to its contract to administer the Local Mental Health Services grants scheme on behalf of the Welsh Assembly Government.
- Providing direct funding for the sector of £19m in 2006-7.
- Launching the sustainable funding project, which has provided a range of training on topics from asset based development to giving and public fundraising. Over 300 participants have attended the first tranche of courses. A supporting website, www.sustainablefundingcymru.org.uk, monthly newsletter Funding news, and one-to-one support for 'champion' organisations completes the service.
- Distribution of new funding totalling £378,762 to 36 projects involving young people (aged 16-24) in volunteering.
- Distribution of Wales: the Active Community funding – £1million to 27 organisations that will deliver Wales-wide volunteering and community involvement projects.

WCVA's Board and its sub-committees have continued to ensure that robust systems are in place to improve the charity's efficiency and effectiveness, and to address internal and external factors that could influence its effectiveness, including:

- Keeping long-term income projections under review and adopting funding strategies to secure resources to maintain its range of charitable activities.
- Becoming a member of the Wales Quality Centre, and becoming the first charity in Wales to achieve the Investors in Excellence standard within the European Foundation for Quality Management (EFQM) model.
- Maintaining Green Dragon level II and *Investors In People* accreditation, and a comprehensive suite of policies, which are regularly reviewed.
- Maintaining good and constructive relations with government and other public bodies at both senior trustee and senior staff levels.

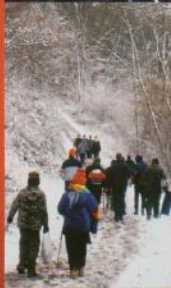
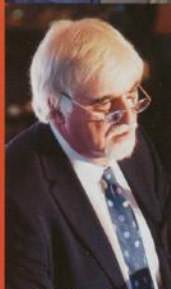


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Adroddiad y Prif Weithredwr

Cefnogi cysylltiadau gweithio rhwng y sector gwirfoddol, y llywodraeth a chyrrff cyhoeddus



Mae WCVA wedi sicrhau bod manylion dros 68 o ymgynghoriadau polisi wedi eu dosbarthu i'r sector trwy ei gyfryngau cyhoeddi a chyfathrebu. Mae wedi cadw cysylltiad gyda grwpiau gwirfoddol a chymunedol trwy ddigwyddiadau polisi rhanbarthol chwarterol, cyfarfodydd ymgynghori, a chefnogaeth i amrywiaeth eang o rwydweithiau, a oedd yn cynnwys bron i 1,800 o bobl. Mae wedi paratoi papurau cefndir ar wyth o faterion polisi, ac wedi ymateb i 23 o gynlluniau polisi sy'n berthnasol i'r sector, gan gynnwys Cronfeydd Strwythurol Ewrop, yr Adolygiad o Wasanaethau Lleol a wneir gan Syr Jeremy Beecham, a Mesur Llywodraeth Cymru. Cafodd buddiannau'r sector eu hadlewyrchu yn y canlynol:

- Argymhellion yr Adolygiad o Wasanaethau Lleol a gynhaliwyd gan Syr Jeremy Beecham.

Cynllun Sector Gwirfoddol y Cynulliad Cenedlaethol

Mae WCVA yn parhau i hwyluso cyfranogaeth y sector gwirfoddol yn y cyfarfodydd chwe misol rhwng pob Gweinidog â rhwydweithiau perthnasol y sector gwirfoddol, a Chyngor Partneriaeth y Sector Gwirfoddol, y ddau ohonynt yn cael eu cynnal dan nawdd Cynllun y Sector Gwirfoddol. Y mae wedi hwyluso rhwydweithiau trydydd sector yn ymwneud â chymunedau, cydraddoldeb a hawliau dynol, camddefnyddio sylweddau, cyfiawnder cymunedol, a iechyd gofal cymdeithasol a lles, yn ogystal â'r rhwydwaith o hwyluswyr iechyd a gofal cymdeithasol lleol a leolir yn y cynghorau gwirfoddol sirol. Mae wedi dal ati i gefnogi'r compactau rhwng y sector

a'r cyrff amgylcheddol cyhoeddus; ac wedi sicrhau bod cysylltiadau'r sector drwy gompactau gydag Awdurdod Datblygu Cymru ac ELWa wedi cael eu cynnal yn dilyn eu huno â Llywodraeth Cynulliad Cymru.

Yn 2006-07 cyhoeddodd Llywodraeth Cynulliad Cymru ei Chynllun Gweithredu Strategol drafft cyntaf ar gyfer Cynllun y Sector Gwirfoddol a bu i WCVA, ynghyd â Chyfranogaeth Cymru, hwyluso pedwar digwyddiad ymgynghori rhanbarthol ar ran Llywodraeth y Cynulliad i gasglu barn y sector. Disgwylir y bydd fersiwn terfynol y Cynllun Gweithredu Strategol, a fydd yn nodi'r weledigaeth ar gyfer gwaith Llywodraeth y Cynulliad yn y sector i'r dyfodol, yn cael ei gyhoeddi ddiwedd 2007.

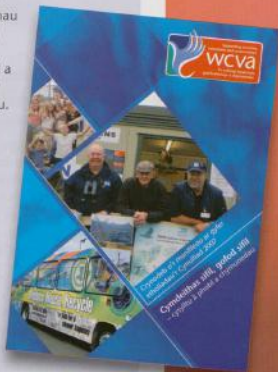
Cymdeithas sifil, gofod sifil – Cysylltu â phobl a chymunedau

Yn ystod y misoedd cyn etholiad y Cynulliad ym mis Mai 2007, cyhoeddodd WCVA fanifesto newydd – *Cymdeithas sifil, gofod sifil* – cysylltu â phobl a chymunedau, a oedd yn pwysleisio'r angen i Lywodraeth newydd y Cynulliad annog grwpiau gwirfoddol a chymunedol i chwarae rhan fwy amlwg wrth gynorthwyo i greu Cymru well. Awgrymodd y manifesto hefyd y dylai Llywodraeth y Cynulliad gynyddu cyswllt y sector gwirfoddol â llunio polisiâu a chyswllt cymunedau lleol â strategaethau cymunedol a blaenoriaethau gwariant yn eu hardaloedd.

Yr oedd cynigion eraill yn cynnwys bod Llywodraeth y Cynulliad yn gweithio gyda'r sector er mwyn:

- Creu cronfa newydd i gynyddu gallu'r sector i ddarparu gwasanaethau cyhoeddus sy'n canolbwyntio ar y dinesydd.

- Ehangu ei rhaglenni i gynyddu gwirfoddoli yn ei holl brif feysydd polisi.
- Targedu arian ychwanegol ar gyfer gwella gwasanaethau'r sector megis cludiant cymunedol mewn ardaloedd gwledig ac ymyiol.
- Cynnwys buddiannau mwy amrywiol ym mhewau deddfu cryfach y Cynulliad a grëwyd drwy fesur Llywodraeth Cymru.





Dywedodd Helen Mary Jones AC wrth gynadleddwyr yng nghynhadledd flynyddol WCVA na allai unrhyw wleidydd ffardio peidio ag ymwneud â chymdeithas sifil, ond bod rhaid i'r sector ddangos ei fod wirioneddol yn siarad dros y bobl y mae'n hanni eu cynrychioli

Cronfa meithrin gallu partneriaethau

Mae'r gronfa hon gan y Cynulliad wedi ei chynllunio'n benodol i gydnabod y cyfraniad y mae cynrychiolwyr a'u mudiadau yn ei wneud wrth fynychu cyfarfodydd Cyngor Partneriaeth y Sector Gwirfoddol, ac wrth gyfranogi yn y cyfarfodydd gyda Gweinidogion.

Yn 2006 – 07 gwahoddwyd ceisiadau am arian ychwanegol a oedd wedi ei neilltuo i gefnogi'r rhwydweithiau mwyaf prin eu hadnoddau. Rhoddwyd arian i bum prosiect o dan y rownd fidio ychwanegol hon, gan gyfrannu cyfanswm o £33,000.

Ar ôl Beecham

Rhoes adroddiad Syr Jeremy Beecham ar wasanaethau cyhoeddus lleol yng Nghymru bwyslais mawr ar bwysigrwydd gwasanaethau di-fwlch ac atebolrwydd i ddinasyddion. Yr oedd hefyd yn hyrwyddo'r egwyddor o economi gymysg o ddarparu, hynny yw, y dylai darparwyr ddo o amrywiaeth o gyrfff cyhoeddus, preifat a'r trydydd sector.

Yng ngoleuni'r adroddiad hwn, a'r ymateb diweddarach gan Lywodraeth Cynulliad Cymru, crëwyd Byrddau Gwasanaeth Lleol a byddir yn ymgynghori ar arweiniad newydd ar strategaethau cymunedol, ac yn ei ryddhau. Dylai'r Bwrdd Gwasanaeth Lleol ym mhob sir gynnwys y trydydd sector ac y mae'n debygol o oruchwylio cyflwyno'r strategaeth gymunedol yn ogystal â sicrhau gwasanaethau di-fwlch yn canolbwyntio ar y dinesydd.

Cydberthynas y trydydd sector â llywodraeth leol

Bu i arolwg ar y cyd gan WCVA/ Cynghorau Gwirfoddol Sirol eleni ddangos bod y berthynas rhwng y trydydd sector a llywodraeth leol yn amrywio o ran ansawdd. Y mae compactau'n parhau yn eu lle, neu'n cael eu hailddrafftio, ac y mae llawer yn cynnwys cyrff eraill o'r sector cyhoeddus megis iechyd a'r heddlu. Mae gan bob un sir ond dwy Gydbwyllgor Cyswllt fel prif ryngwyneb rhwng yr awdurdod lleol a'r sector gwirfoddol.

Mae'r trydydd sector yn cydnabod y bydd ei ymgysylltiad â Byrddau Gwasanaeth Lleol yn allweddol o ran ei ddylanwad dros bolisiau a gwasanaethau lleol. Mae rhai siroedd hefyd yn dechrau edrych ar ffyrdd o gynnwys y trydydd sector mewn prosesau craffu.

Cadw golwg ar wariant y llywodraeth ar y sector

Cynyddodd y gwariant yr adroddwyd arno gan Lywodraeth Cynulliad Cymru i'r trydydd sector o £125.3 miliwn yn 2004-05 i £162.5 miliwn yn 2005-06. Yr oedd hyn oherwydd nifer o ffactorau: cynyddodd cyllid gan y gyfarwyddiaeth dai, sy'n cynnwys grantiau tai i gymdeithasau tai a chyllid Cefnogi Pobl, yn sylweddol iawn, o £39 miliwn i £99 miliwn. Fodd bynnag, gostyngodd gwariant o raglenni Ewropeaidd o £29 miliwn i £18 miliwn, a gostyngodd cyllid o'r gyfarwyddiaeth Gymunedau o £19 miliwn i £11 miliwn. Darparodd cyrff cyhoeddus a noddir gan y Cynulliad gyllid o oddeutu £43 miliwn, a'r prif newid oedd cwmpw yng nghyllid Cyngor Chwaraeon Cymru p £14 miliwn i £6 miliwn.

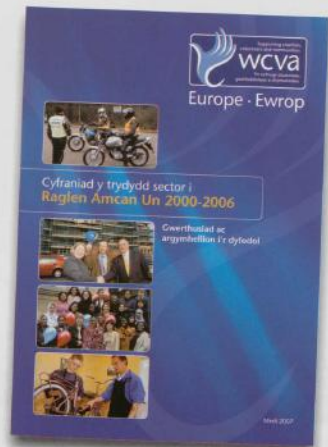

Bu Samariaid Caerdydd a'r Cylliniau yn dathlu 40 mlynedd o weithio yng nghymuned Caerdydd a chymoedd y De yn 2006. Mae'r gangen yn cael ei staffio'n llwyr gan oddeutu 100 o wirfoddolwyr, sy'n ateb tua 30,000 o alwadau a negeseuan e-bost y llwyddyn gan bobl sydd mewn trallod. Derbyniodd y gangen grant gan y Gronfa Gwirfoddoli yng Nghymru. Yn y llun uchod y mae gwirfoddolwyr a'r gangen gyda'r Prif Weinidog Rhodri Morgan AC a Julie Morgan AS.

Cronfa Gwirfoddoli yng Nghymru (ViWF)

Mae'r Gronfa Gwirfoddoli yng Nghymru, sy'n cael ei chefnogi gan Lywodraeth Cynulliad Cymru, yn un o'r prif gynlluniau ariannu sy'n cynorthwyo i recriwtio gwirfoddolwyr newydd. Gall grantiau ViWF gynorthwyo i recriwtio a hyfforddi gwirfoddolwyr newydd; annog gweithgarwch mewn ardaloedd lle nad yw gwirfoddoli wedi datblygu llawer; a datblygu arferion gwirfoddoli da. Mae £920,301 wedi ei neilltuo i 20 prosiect gwirfoddoli newydd, 38 prosiect parhau a 29 swyddfa gwirfoddoli. Nod y rhai sy'n derbyn grant yw recriwtio oddeutu 6,100 o wirfoddolwyr newydd – gan wneud gwahaniaeth sylweddol i ansawdd bywyd llawer o bobl yng nghymunedau Cymru.

Cynllun Buddsoddi i Gryfhau Gwirfoddoli (CBGG)

Lywodraeth Cynulliad Cymru wedi ei glustnodi gan WCVA i gefnogi'r prosiect, a dosbarthwyd yr arian hwn ar lefel sirol i aelodau consortia sy'n cymryd rhan. Amcangyfrifir bod 5400 o wirfoddolwyr newydd wedi cael eu recriwtio gan y canolfannau gwirfoddoli o ganlyniad i arian CBGG (VEIS) yn ystod trydedd flwyddyn y cynllun.

Cymru: Cymdeithas Fyw

Y mae cynllun grantiau Llywodraeth Cynulliad Cymru, sy'n newydd i WCVA, yn anelu at gefnogi gwirfoddoli a chyfranogiad cymunedol. Yn 2006-07 dyfarnwyd £1 miliwn i 27 o fudiadau a fydd yn cyflwyno prosiectau ledled Cymru o 2007 i 2010.

Dros y tair blynedd nesaf, bydd y prosiectau hyn yn derbyn cyfanswm o £3 miliwn, gyda'r nod o 'ail-greu ymdeimlad o gymuned o Fôn i Fynwy', trwy godi profil a sbarduno mwy o wirfoddoli a datblygu cymunedol. Nid oedd y cynllun yn agored ond i'r mudiadau trydydd sector hynny a allai ddarparu'r prosiectau ar sail Cymru-gyfan, ac a allai dargedu a chefnogi pobl o gymunedau penodol yn effeithiol: cymunedau gwledig, ieuencid, lleiafrifoedd ethnig, pobl h n, pobl anabl, gweithwyr.

Cefnogaeth i Wasanaethau Pontio Gwirfoddol

Mae'r cynllun hwn yn darparu grant gan Lywodraeth Cynulliad Cymru i gyrrif cyfngol yn y trydydd sector sy'n cefnogi gwirfoddoli ac yn annog cydweithio ac ymarfer da. Mae'r cynllun yn ei llwyddyn olaf, ac yn 2006-07 dyfarnwyd cyllid i chwe mudiad, set cyfanswm o £283,746.



Gweithio tuag at y dyfarniad Buddsoddiwyr mewn Pobl. Mae 18 o fudiadau wedi'u cofrestru'n awr ar gyfer eu hachredu.

Mae WCVA wedi datblygu ei gefnogaeth i fudiadau cymunedol yn uniongyrchol a thrwy fod yn aelod o Rwydwaith Cefnogi Cymunedau yn Gyntaf. Yn 2006-07, dyfarnwyd 92 o grantiau a oedd yn werth £179,724.

Cymunedau yn Gyntaf

Bu i gynhadledd Rhwydwaith Cefnogi Cymunedau yn Gyntaf ar feithrin perthynas â'r cyhoedd, a drefnwyd gan WCVA, ddenu dros 100 o bobl o'r gwasanaethau statudol a oedd yn awyddus i glywed am fyfyrdd o weithio gyda chymunedau.

Cyfranogaeth Cymru

Byrddau Iechyd Lleol ddatblygu eu sgiliau i weithio gyda dinasyddion, defnyddwyr a chymunedau.

Sgiliau ar gyfer Adfywio

Mae'r prosiect Sgiliau ar gyfer Adfywio yn cynnig cyfle i 13 o brentisiaid ddod yn weithwyr datblygu cymunedol cymwys, profiadol a chyflogedig. Y mae'r prosiect, a arweinir gan WCVA ar ran Rhwydwaith Cefnogi Cymunedau yn Gyntaf, yn cefnogi chwe mudiad i ddarparu cwrs hyfforddi achrededig a phrofiad gwaith i bob prentis. Dechreuodd

y 13 prentis, sydd i gyd yn byw mewn ardaloedd Cymunedau yn Gyntaf ar eu gwaith ym mis Ionawr 2007 ac mae ganddynt 18 mis i gwblhau'u prentisiaeth.

Risg Gymdeithasol

Bu'r Gronfa Risg Gymdeithasol yn cefnogi mudiadau gwirfoddol bach ledled Cymru er 2001 ac mae'n awr yn ei blwyddyn olaf ar gyfer ceisiadau. Mae'n darparu grantiau gwerth hyd at £10,000 i brosiectau sy'n gwella sgiliau ac yn mynd i'r afael ag allgau gymdeithasol. Mae'n cael ei hariannu'n rhannol gan Lywodraeth Cynulliad Cymru a Chronfa Gymdeithasol Ewrop, a'i nod yw cefnogi adfywiad cymunedau ledled Cymru trwy gefnogi grwpiau a mudiadau bach i roi cynnig ar weithgareddau newydd. Yn ystod 2006-07 dyfarnwyd grantiau gwerth cyfanswm o £1,024,487, gan gynorthwyo 108 o fudiadau gyda'u prosiectau. Yn ystod wythnosau olaf y cynllun, derbyniwyd dros 150 yn fwy o geisiadau. Mae Gwraidd yn gynllun a sefydlwyd i gynorthwyo pobl mewn ardaloedd gyda statws Cymunedau yn Gyntaf ac Amcan 1, i ddatblygu eu sgiliau a'u hyder er mwyn eu galluogi i wneud cyfraniad ymarferol yn eu cymunedau. Bydd Gwraidd yn ystyried ceisiadau am amrywiaeth eang o weithgareddau, sy'n datblygu sgiliau, hyder a chyfranogiad. Yn 2006-07, ariannwyd 27 o geisiadau a rhoddwyd grantiau gwerth £60,355.

Cronfa Ymddiriedolaeth Cymunedau yn Gyntaf

Nod Cronfa Ymddiriedolaeth Cymunedau yn Gyntaf yw cefnogi unrhyw fath o weithgarwch sy'n cynnwys pobl leol, trwy gyfrwng mudiadau cymunedol bach, sydd o fudd i'w cymuned. Rhaid i'r gweithgareddau roi rhyw gymaint o fudd economaidd, amgylcheddol, cymdeithasol neu ddiwyllianol i'r bobl sy'n byw mewn ardal Cymunedau yn Gyntaf. Yn 2006-07, dyfarnwyd 1,011 o grantiau a oedd yn werth £2,613,943.

Cynllun Grantiau Iechyd Meddwl

Pwrpas y Cynllun Grantiau Iechyd Meddwl Lleol yw cefnogi a gwella cyfraniad y sector gwirfoddol i'r gofal a gaiff pobl sy'n wynebu problemau iechyd meddwl, eu teuluoedd a'u gofawlyr, yng Nghymru. Cynlluniau Ailgylchu Strategol (CAS)

Mae WCVA yn parhau i hyrwyddo ailgylchu a chynlluniau amgylcheddol cymunedol drwy'r Cynllun Ailgylchu Statudol, y rhaglen ailgylchu fwyaf erioed yng Nghymru yn cynnwys pob sector.

Mae'r CAS yn gynllun grant integredig, a luniwyd i gwrdd ag anghenion hyd at ddwsin o bartneriaethau strategol sirol yng Nghymru. Mae'n cynnig cyllid i gyrff gwirfoddol/cymunedol, mewn partneriaeth gyda mudiadau yn y sectorau preifat a chyhoeddus i'w galluogi i ddatblygu prosiectau cynaliadwy ym maes dargyfeirio gwastraff ac adfer adnoddau.

Wedi'i lansio yn Ebrill 2004, mae'r CAS bellach wedi'i ymestyn hyd fis Mehefin 2008 er y disgwylir i brosiectau unigol ddod i ben ddiwedd Mawrth/ddechrau Ebrill 2008, gan roi cyfle i WCVA werthuso'r rhaglen gyfan yn drylwyr.

Ariennir CAS gan gyllid Ewropeaidd ERDF ac ESF, gyda chyllid 'cyfatebol' yn dod gan y partneriaid eu hunain ynghyd â Llywodraeth Cynulliad Cymru. Mae'r rhan fwyaf o gyfanswm costau prosiectau, sef bron i £30 miliwn, yn dod o elfen ERDF y prosiect.

Fan ailgylchu Tidy Treo, a ariannwyd dan y Cynllun Ailgylchu Strategol, yn codi gwastraff i'w ailgylchu yn ardal Blaenau Gwent.

Erbyn canol 2007, yr oedd dros 137,000 tonnelli o wastraff wedi'i ailgylchu gan brosiectau CAS, felly yr ydym mewn sefyllfa dda i wneud yn well na'r targed terfynol o 162,881. Er nad yn un o'r prosiectau mwyaf, mae Blaenau Gwent yn enghraifft dda, lle y mae dros 30,000 o gartrefi wedi elwa o'r prosiect a thros 3,000 tonnelli wedi'u dargyfeirio o safleoedd tirlenwi yn yr ardal hon yn unig. Wrth i'r fwyddyn ddirwyn i ben, y mae'r partneriaid cymal yn strategaethau gadael eu hunain, gan dderbyn cefnogaeth cyllarfoddydd aml o'r bartneriaeth a'r grŵp rheoli.

Ei nod yw cyfrannu at ddatblygu cynaliadwy drwy gefnogi gweithredu gwirfoddol i warchod a gwella'r amgylchedd. Er 1992, mae wedi cynnig gwasanaeth datblygu penodol, ac wedi darparu pum ffrwd grant sy'n cefnogi gweithredu amgylcheddol ymarferol. Yn 2006-07 dyfarnodd Amgylchedd Cymru 166 o grantiau gwerth £643,765 i brosiectau yn y gymuned ledled Cymru. Galluogodd hyn i fwy na 12,000 o wirfoddolwyr gyfrannu bron 200,000 o oriau er lles yr amgylchedd yng Nghymru.

Caiff benthyciadau eu strwythuro i gwrdd ag anghenion mudiadau unigol. Gellir ystyried telerau arbennig megis ar gyfer ad-dalu llog a pheidio â gorfod ad-dalu'r cyfalaf dros gyfnod estynedig, ac y mae grantiau o hyd at £20,000 ar gael i helpu i gynyddu gallu i ymgymryd â chyllid ar fenthgy.

Ariennir y Gronfa gan Gronfa Datblygu Rhanbarthol Ewrop. Rheolir a gweinyddir hi gan Gyngor Gweithredu Gwirfoddol Cymru ar y cyd â phartneriaid y prosiect, Cymdeithas Ymddiriedolaethau Datblygu Cymru a Chanolfan Cydweithredol Cymru, ar ran Rhwydwaith Cefnogi Cymunedau yn Gyntaf. Lanswyd y Gronfa ym mis Gorffennaf 2006. Yn ystod 2006-07 dyfarnwyd cyfanswm o £705,000 o fenthyciadau a grantiau o £56,000 i naw mudiad. Gwelwyd cynnydd sylweddol yn y cynigion a gyflwynwyd yn y flwyddyn ariannol gyfredol. Mae'r rhaglen bresennol i fod i ddog i ben ym mis Mehefin 2008.
